As a national field organizer for a civil liberties agency, she helps people understand the capacity of their combined voices and the value of their grassroots knowledge and expertise. She believes that people are often hesitant to speak out because they think that lawmakers, not the community members themselves, are better experts on how a community should be. In order for things to change, communities must change what they believe is possible — and the way to do this is to work together.

Rebuilding sustainable communities



Danielle Neus is growing more than food — she is also sowing seeds of community organizing as she helps urban Haitians build a self-directed and sustainable future.

Danielle Neus is helping bring successful rural gardening techniques to the capital city of Haiti. She shares practices that can lead to individual self-sufficiency as well as national food sovereignty. Danielle is teaching people how to grow personal gardens using recycled tires, which serve as containers that conserve water and hold nutrients in the soil. Families gain the knowledge and tools they need to eat healthily, make a living, and build strong, safe communities. She collaborates with other young adults who shared the same vision. They use popular education, which invites Haitians to work together, learn from each other, combine their resources, and find solutions that benefit the entire community. Their next step is to open their own training center in the city, so that they can train more families.

Promoting workers' rights and a living wage



Nelson Escobar is teaching workers to demand the wages they earned and to claim the rights they deserve.

Nelson Escobar came to the United States from El Salvador seeking asylum but then experienced oppressive working conditions at a cleaning company. When workers are bullied and intimidated, it impacts their well-being, their families, and working conditions for everyone. Nelson found resources at a workers' justice center in Arkansas. Now he helps others overcome poverty, immigration challenges, and language barriers by learning about their rights and accessing support from workers' centers and other organizations.
